Summary

- The model of providing support to families is changing.
- The intention is to move to a universal offer for 0-19 year olds ((25 for Special Educational Needs and Disabilities [SEND] and Care Experienced Young People).
- To do that, we have been listening to parents and carers to get a better understanding of how they have used Children's Centres and what they value most. This has given us a clearer idea of how Family Hubs can be most beneficial to families in future.
- We are proposing a model of delivery, utilising buildings that have previously been used as Children's Centres, to provide a combination of Family Hub centres in each District council area, and outreach hubs in local communities.
- There are 27 children's centres across Devon. This proposal suggests that:
 - o five are maintained to use as Family Hubs
 - o up to eighteen could potentially be used in an outreach capacity, if partners are open to this arrangement
 - o three will be completely passed to partners for alternative use such as childcare.
 - o one will close.
- This consultation seeks the views of parents, young people and partners about the intended changes. These will help to inform the design and implementation of the new approach to delivering family support.



Introduction

The council needs to develop services to meet growing demand, while balancing unprecedented financial challenges. Rising demand on council services such as those that keep children, young people, and vulnerable adults safe, combined with higher costs for fuel, delivering council services that keep our communities clean and our infrastructure safe means that balancing our budget has become increasingly difficult over the last few years, exacerbated by the impacts of Covid and the cost-of-living crisis.

We are taking the opportunity to make improvements to the way we interact with our families, to be innovative and develop new ways of working that uses improving technology and meets the needs of an evolving population. We are still dedicated and focused on achieving better services for our children and young people in ways that are efficient, effective and achieving best value for the council. We are making services as streamline as possible and prioritising the services that are the most needed in our communities. However, more work needs to be done through meaningful engagement with service users and key stakeholders, with some difficult decisions needing to be made that could affect some services that our communities use and recognise.

Since 2018, Children's Centres in Devon have provided targeted support to families with children aged 0-8, this support was only available to families who met a certain level of need and was accessed via referral only. During the financial year 2024/25, the current provider will be working with Devon County Council and our partners to develop Family Hubs which will expand support to families with children aged 0-19 (25 with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities [SEND] and Care Experienced Young People). The focus of developing Family Hubs is to improve access to services and improve the connections between families, professionals, and services who work with them. To achieve this, we have reviewed the current Children's Centre buildings. Some of these will be used as Family Hub bases moving forward but some are not suitable as Family Hubs, as a result, alternative arrangements are being proposed. Beyond the 2024/25 financial year, Family Hubs will be reviewed within the funds available, which could result in alternative service provision of the service. Over the medium term the family hub model will continue to be reviewed to ensure the needs of the family's accessing services are being met, that the right services are being brought together and that best value is being achieved.

What's changing?

Children's Centres have been a unique stand-alone service, delivered in Devon, by the current provider, supporting families with children aged 0 to 8 and providing a range of services to help children get a good start in life. Family Hubs will bring more services together and expand this offer to support those with children aged 0 to 19, or up to 25 years old for young people with SEND and who are Care Experienced.

Family Hubs will provide a network of services which will include universal and targeted support, including support from health partners and the voluntary sector. Throughout the transition the provider will work with families to navigate their way to the right services or support for them and will work with the Council and community partners to build services suited to the individual area. Building on and enhancing the support networks which are already in place.

Family Hubs will offer early support to families to help them overcome difficulties and build strong relationships, enabling us to put strong families at the heart of communities, in recognition of how important they are for individuals and families to thrive.

The programme will change the way services are delivered over time as we work to develop the multi-agency network of support available through Family Hubs. Some buildings used by the Children's Centres are already shared with partners, such as midwives and health visitors, so options to bring more services together will be developed, while still making sure the needs of local families are met.



What is a Family Hub and what will it offer?

A Family Hub is a place where families can go (either in person, digitally or via telephone,) to access the support they need to manage the issues they may be experiencing. The hubs will have a network of practitioners and organisations who will come together in local communities with families offering:

- Greater access to advice and information linked to a range of services, interventions, and local opportunities.
- Supporting an **early response for families**, which in turn could prevent escalation of need and reduce referrals into specialist and statutory services. Family Hub staff could co-ordinate an Early Help assessment, as part of the wider Early Help offer and support through to specialist and statutory services when needed.
- **Welcoming virtual and physical spaces** which will grow and develop, forming part of the family hub network in your local area, which families can visit or contact to access the support they need. Enabling support to the be offered at the point of need, as far as possible. This will include outreach hubs developed alongside those community hubs in existing in areas and created where they don't exist.
- Supporting families to connect with opportunities in their local communities supporting needs. Including enabling families to get involved with supporting other families in the communities.
- Supporting families to navigate pathways to higher level and specialist intervention which may be needed and keeping in contact with families while they gain access to these pathways.
- Forming partnerships in communities, increasing connections between organisations working within the same community.
- Enabling, growing, and linking opportunities and activities available in a local community to best support families.
- **Promoting learning and upskilling** local communities to support families. For example, understanding parental wellbeing; early brain development, attachment, and child development; promoting home learning environments and preparation for school.
- Offering intervention to families in need of specific support to manage their situation.
- **Ensuring best value** and quality services to families, in partnership with the current community-based offer and within the resources available.



Who could form part of a local family hub network and offer in a local community?

Our intention is to have consistently good services across Devon. However, the network of support services may differ across the diverse areas within Devon, but services may include some of the following, working as part of a hub to ensure families are navigated to the right organisation, or specific intervention to meet their needs. This list is not exclusive and may include many other organisations working in our city, towns, and villages.

- Early Help services.
- Wider early years services and early education support.
- Public Health services.
- Public Health Nursing.
- Midwifery services.
- Partners supporting as part of the Best Start in Life national initiative.
- Charity, voluntary and third sector partners including faith groups offering opportunities for families in their local communities.
- Partners supporting drug, alcohol and domestic abuse or violence support.
- Partners supporting wider community health and wellbeing support for children and young people.
- The Council led Disabled Children's Services.
- Partners supporting delivery of youth services.
- Schools, colleges, and Devon Schools Leadership Services (DSLS).
- Social care services delivered by the Council directly (Integrated Adult Social Care and Children).
- Childcare settings, for example, childminders; nurseries and pre-school settings.
- Partners providing careers and employability services in Devon to children, adults, and families.
- · Partners delivering libraries.
- Education support teams.
- District Councils.



- Partners supporting children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities and their families.
- Safeguarding teams, for example, Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub for children and young people (MASH).
- Social prescribing teams, wellbeing co-ordinators, community connectors and builders.

Why consult?

This consultation seeks views from families and professionals on proposed changes to our current Children's Centre buildings and the services we offer within them, as we start our journey towards the development of Family Hubs.

Through our recent engagement, lots of you have told us that services are often difficult to access due to the rurality of Devon, the availability of transport and location of support, for example.

Families have told us that they want to be able to access support in friendly, welcoming, non-judgemental, open, and safe spaces on a drop-in basis, without appointment, criteria or waiting lists and which can be suitable for the whole family. Families would like multifunctional spaces which can support them to meet with their peers, as well as a range of practitioners who are all working together. Spaces where they can access more face-to-face advice, information and support if preferred and which also enable families to learn more about what support is out there and is available locally to them in their communities. Practitioners have told us they would also like to be able to use shared, local, multi-functional spaces with good access to IT and WIFI; which are well connected; affordable; sustainable; friendly, welcoming, and safe spaces supporting relationships with families; and which provide a platform for shared learning and efficient use of resources for all.

The consultation will open on 8th May 2024 and close at midnight on 3rd July 2024.

The move to Family Hubs will be gradual, based on the needs of each community. The buildings we use need to be able to meet the needs of the whole family in a coordinated way, be somewhere we can co-locate services, be easily accessible to families and well used.



We would welcome your thoughts on which Children's Centres you think would be most suitable to become a Family Hubs, or outreach hub spaces where we can join other services to be more visible in our communities.

Please see a summary of the proposals about the current Children's Centre buildings in the table below. We will continue to keep the use of buildings under review so that we can expand the offer into other parts of the county as needed, including how we can make use of other community spaces such as halls and libraries.

Given the size of Devon, it is proposed that there will be at least one hub in each district area (ten in total across Devon). These buildings will be places where staff can come together, and families can access support. There will be some meeting rooms and space for staff to come together to learn and develop their skills, as well as some group delivery space.

The outreach hub spaces will provide options for families to access various services and guidance in their own community. These will be linked to existing community services in different locations (such as schools, libraries, community hospitals and community centres) so that families can access services from familiar and trusted spaces that respond to their needs. There may not be always a Family Hub navigator presence in outreach areas, but there will be digital access 24 hours a day and a phone contact during office hours.

Outreach means support can be offered on an "as and when needed" basis in areas where there may not be a "hub" base. Much of the work currently offered by the Childrens Centres are in the family's own homes, or by using community venues near to the families. With this flexible model the need for a "defined" building is reduced and services can be taken to families, rather than them needing to travel to access them. Services can be offered in places which are meaningful, "known and trusted" by the families and can reduce the need for travel. Devon is a large rural county, with limited public transport options, therefore a flexible model with a combination of face to face, virtual and digital support is essential.



Exeter Locality Family Hub Proposal

It is proposed that the Exeter Family Hub is based at the Chestnut Centre, in Wonford, with outreach hub spaces in many areas across the city including, Westexe, Pinhoe, and West Clyst, Beacon Heath, the city centre and Exminster.
